



SOLEMNITY OF THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

JANUARY 4, 2026 | 05

GRACE AND PEACE TO YOU, MY BROTHERS AND SISTERS,

New Year's blessings to all of you. Each year, as we celebrate the Epiphany of the Lord, the Church encourages us to reflect on one of the most intimate scenes in the Gospel: The Magi, wise seekers from distant lands, who arrive to worship the newborn Jesus. Mary and Joseph, in their humble setting, welcoming these wise men. Their journey from all corners of the earth serves as a powerful reminder of how God revealed himself to all nations. God, in the form of a baby, showed the nations his saving power and continues to reveal himself to us in every season of our lives.

The Magi came from far lands, bringing the hopes, questions, and gifts of their nations. Their arrival demonstrates that Christ is not offered only to one people or one place. This Gospel passage fulfills the prophecy of Isaiah that the Lord will gather all the nations. The Christ Baby gathers to himself, in his early infancy, all peoples. From the very beginning, God opens the doors of salvation wide, inviting every culture, every heart, every seeker toward his light. The Magi serve as the first sign that the newborn King is truly Emmanuel, God with us, for all of humanity.


The Magi's gifts (gold, frankincense, and myrrh) are beautiful symbols, but even more impactful is the spirit in which they are offered. They give what they have. They provide with love. They give in wonder. They give kneeling before a humble Child in the arms of Mary and under the care of Joseph. In that simple stable, their offering becomes worship. I wonder what Joseph and Mary thought when they saw these three wise men come down on their knees to pay homage to their baby. The Archangel's words suddenly made sense. God fulfills his promises.

The Magi also teach us how to find God in our own lives. They allow themselves to be guided by a star. The star led them to Jesus. We may not have a star guiding us in the sky, but we have the Sacred Scripture and the gift of the Holy Spirit, received in our baptism. They did not know the whole path, but they trusted the light they had received. They persevered through uncertainty. They asked questions. They kept going. And because they kept seeking, they found

the King of Kings in a manger. Are you ready to take the challenge this year to be a seeker of the Lord? To ask questions to learn about the Lord? To intentionally grow in our journey of discipleship together?

As we start this new year, the Feast of Epiphany prompts us to ask: What is God presenting to me? What light is guiding me toward deeper faith, hope, and charity? What questions should I ask myself to strengthen my relationship with the Lord? What gifts do I have, and am I called to offer them to Christ and his people? Like the Magi, we may not know exactly where the road will lead. But if we follow God's gentle light, no matter how small or subtle it seems, we will find ourselves gradually drawn closer to Jesus. Along the way, we will realize that the greatest gift isn't what we bring but what we receive: the joy of encountering the Lord who reveals himself to everyone who seeks him.
