# GRACE AND PEACE. MY BROTHERS AND SISTERS IN CHRIST

Many of you are familiar with "The Chosen," a series based on the Gospels, with certain freedoms, that present the life of Jesus and his disciples. As I prayed with this week's scriptures, it became evident that the concept of being chosen is the common thread that ties together all three readings for this weekend. In the Old Testament reading, Amos confronts the people who do not want to listen to him, saying that he was not born a prophet and was minding his own business when God chose him to be a prophet. He cannot escape God's mission given to him. St. Paul also reminds us we have received all kinds of blessings and have been chosen by God through our Lord Jesus Christ in the grace of baptism. In the Gospel, Jesus chooses his twelve and sends them two by two to proclaim his Kingdom. Jesus gives them authority to heal and cast out unclean spirits. He shares with them his power for the mission. The only thing he requires of them is total surrender to God's care, trusting that he will provide for them. They are sent with Jesus' power, but lightly packed for the mission. They are told not to carry anything extra with them.


Amos, the apostles, and early Christians are all chosen for a mission and purpose within God's Reign. Amos is to prophesy, to speak on behalf of God, against the injustices of his fellow Israelites. The apostles are to share in Christ's ministry and prepare many people's hearts for the dawn of the Reign of God. The early Christians are to be the community that embodies Christ's presence in the world and to be witnesses of Christ to the ends of the earth. The apostles and the early Christians understood that we are a church on a mission. We are people chosen to go out to bring the Good News of Christ to others, the Good News of God's immeasurable love manifested in the Life, Passion, Death, and Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. As we journey in the XXI century, my brothers and sisters, I invite you to find ways that God has chosen you to bring healing, joy, and good news to others. This week, each one of us can take steps to make God's Kingdom here on earth a reality in the vocations that God has given to each one of us. Just as Amos found his true calling, we must also see our calling and answer God's call with unwavering commitment. So, what is the call God is whispering in your heart this week?

On a more mundane note, last weekend, I finished my rotation in the new communities of this big Catholic Community in Racine. I am grateful for your warm welcome and the joyful feedback we have received. There is such a significant momentum now amongst our communities. We praise the Lord for that. We are seizing this momentum; two fantastic events are coming up that I want you to mark your calendars for: **on July 23, at 6 p.m.**, we invite all young adults from 21-35 years to come to a Meet and Greet Cookout at St. Sebastian's rectory from 6-8 p.m. **On August 6, at 6 p.m.**, on the Feast of the Transfiguration, we are going to have a Food for the Journey event in St. Richard's, beginning with Mass and a Holy Hour. You are all invited. As we continue, let us pray for each other on this journey. I have all of you in my prayers. I hope you all remember to say a prayer for us.

Finally, I would like to thank all the volunteers and everyone who participated in preparing St. Lucy's Festival to make it an excellent event for all of us here in Racine. Events like this cannot happen without the unwavering commitment of such a great army of volunteers and passionate servants of the Lord. THANK YOU.

# WISCONSIN CATHOLIC CONFERENCE OUR CALL AS CATHOLIC CITIZENS

Politics, for its part, should always be understood not as an appropriation of power, but as the "highest form of charity", and thus of service to one's neighbor within a local or national community. - Pope Francis



Catholic Social Teaching (CST) helps to discern which public policies and politicians best embody a respect for human dignity and the common good. This is especially important at election time. As the U.S. bishops said in November 2023, "On these often complex matters, it is the laity's responsibility to form their consciences and grow in the virtue of prudence to approach the many and varied issues of the day with the mind of Christ." To form our consciences, the following questions can help Catholics discern who best embodies the principles of CST:

# Where does a candidate stand on:

- protecting human life from conception to natural death?
- preserving the state ban on abortion,
   assisted suicide, euthanasia, and the death
   penalty?
- upholding the innate equality, dignity, and complementarity of male and female?
- protecting marriage as the lifelong union of one man and one woman?
- respecting the family and parents as the primary educators of their children?
- providing resources to vulnerable women and children?
- protecting religious freedom at home and abroad?

- eliminating **violence**, whether by guns, war, terrorism, torture, abuse, or trafficking?
- assuring basic support for people living in poverty, domestically and internationally?
- treating all migrants and refugees with dignity and respect?
- eliminating racism?
- increasing access to housing, healthcare, and education?
- upholding the dignity of work and the rights of workers?
- preserving our environment and natural resources?
- and all that promotes human dignity and the common good?
